





Italy's Cineca, is a public, nonprofit consortium made up of 71 Italian universities, three research institutions and the Italian Ministry of Education and Research. In addition to providing supercomputing services to Italy's research community, its student information system, ESSE3, is used by 80% of all Italian universities, serving roughly 1.4 million students. Cineca is a founding member of the Rome Student Systems and Standards Group (RS3G), standardizing the exchange of student and course information across the Europe.

- ESSE3 project started in 2001 to satisfy the <u>new</u> Italian regulation on Higher Education in the *Bologna Process* scenario.
- In 2015 ESSE3 is used in 78% of Italian
 Universties and manages more than 1.4 Million students from admission to graduation through post-doc.
- The <u>same</u> system is used by <u>all</u> the different institutions – this allows the Ministry to <u>effectively steer</u> the universities toward the new educational policies.




Bologna Process objectives for the European Higher Education Area

- 1. Easily readable and comparable degrees, also through the implementation of the **Diploma Supplement**,
- 2. Adoption of a system essentially based on three main Cycles
- 3. Establishment of a **System of Credits** such as in the ECTS system
- 4. Promotion of **Mobility** by overcoming obstacles to the effective exercise of free movement
- 5. Promotion of European co-operation in **Quality Assurance**
- 6. Promotion of the necessary **Global dimension** in higher education
